Head east on Ann St NW across Grand River Bridge 0.2 mi
Turn right onto Monroe Ave NW 0.7 mi
Turn left onto Leonard St NW 0.2 mi
Turn right onto Plainfield Ave NE 0.2 mi
Continue onto Division Ave N 1.3 mi
Turn left onto Fulton St E
Destination will be on the right 0.1 mi
